CHANGES TO Building Security

As MSLCC moves toward improved customer service and safety for our residents, staff, and visitors, we've recently implemented a new security system on our campus. Beginning in early October, all entry and exit doors are locked 24 hours a day, with the exception of the main entrance, Door 1, which is open Monday through Friday from 8 to 5. All the locked entrances, including visitor entrances 3, 5,

and 19 may be accessed through a newly installed door bell system. Security staff will provide support evenings and weekends. With these newly implemented security measures, we will undoubtedly experience some challenges. We ask for your patience and prayers as we make this transition.

RESIDENT SERVICES Report

It has been a busy, but great year here at MSLCC. We achieved ten years of continuous participation in the Occupational Safety and Health Administration **Voluntary Protection** Program (OSHA VPP). This program encourages industries to prevent workplace injuries and illness through hazard prevention and control, worksite analysis, training, and cooperation between leadership and staff. It is not an easy process

to receive VPP status and it is an honor to sustain this high level of performance for 10 consecutive years. This takes commitment from every member of our organization to assure employee safety and health excellence. Because of this, we received the "Decades of Excellence" award.

Pelican Health began offering onsite services to our residents this year. They are able to provide gynecological and urological services to our residents. Due to the chronic nature of pelvic health problems, services from Pelican Health can improve the quality of life and ensure dignity for our residents. Residents receive the benefit of these services without leaving our facility.

The Palliative Care Teams at both CHI St. Alexius Health and Sanford Health have also started offering their services onsite at MSLCC. The goal of Palliative Care is to improve quality of life for residents. Palliative Care is offered to residents at any stage in a serious illness and can be provided alongside all other appropriate curative treatments. In addition, Palliative Care provides support to family members and staff. The Palliative Care Teams that makes onsite visits to MSLCC include a physician, nurse practitioner, and nurse.

We have implemented the Point Click Care Skin and Wound Module. Our nurses use a mobile device, like an iPad or iPod, to take a picture of a wound in the app. The app then assists with measurements and documentation on the status of the wound. Providers

have access to these pictures while they are at MSLCC or from their offices, enabling the providers to see trends early, make informed decisions, and modify treatment if needed in real time. Better outcomes and reduced risk should be seen with this improved and timely decision making.

With Kaitlyn Green's move to Director of Valley View Heights, Tara Huss-Redding has taken over as our new Director of Social Services. Linda Patzner, the North Central Unit Director, retired, and April Fugleberg took her place. They are all doing well in retirement and their new leadership positions.

A lack of evidence was found that proves alarms actually prevent falls or injuries. In fact, research now shows that alarms that are intended to prevent falls and injuries may actually be causing them. Alarms can cause frequent disruption in a resident's rest and sleep and can increase confusion and restlessness. These negative effects do not just affect the resident who has an alarm, they affect all residents in the care center. Chair alarms also cause noise disruption in unit lounges or other common areas, increasing the likelihood of restlessness and agitation in many residents. Due to these findings, we are striving to make MSLCC alarmfree.

We are committed to respecting residents' rights when and if a resident desires to self-administer medication. MSLCC is tasked with determining that the practice is safe for the resident and other residents in the facility. For this reason, we request that all medications, prescription and over-the-counter, are brought to the nurses' station. This will assure the proper assessment has been performed and the medication has been accounted for. In addition, all resident belongings, i.e., clothing, glasses, or shoes, should be brought to the nurses' station. These items must be marked to assure they are available for your loved one to use.

I would like to thank the board, staff, residents, family members, and volunteers for enabling MSLCC to innovate and progress as we have this past year. Your support in the coming year will be equally important as we continue to innovate and grow. This will assure that we are able to provide the highest quality services to our residents in the future, while remaining mindful of our mission to enrich lives with love and compassion.

Many people wonder about the role of the social worker in a long-term care facility. The social worker will work with residents and families by identifying their psychosocial, mental and emotional needs.

We work with the interdisciplinary team and administration to promote and protect resident rights and the psychological well-being of each resident. We have several staff in the Social Services Department to meet the needs of our residents and families.

Our staff of six serves all residents in the facility. Linda Vogel is our Social Services Admissions Coordinator. Gwen Bauer, LSW, is our Social Work Assistant. Levi Kilzer, LSW, covers the West and West View Units. Rhonda Ames-Nelson, LSW, and Jessica Patch, LSW, cover the South Central and South East units.

Environmental Services Department

Missouri Slope Lutheran

bath spa rooms are a
welcome update with
regard to the comfort,
safety and privacy of
our residents and their
caregivers.

As the holidays approach, we suggest

that you check on items of need and sizes for your loved ones. Trying on clothes can be a challenge and returns are inconvenient. Choose wash and wear items; dry clean only articles are not recommended. Most residents appreciate fleece sweaters and blankets. Undergarments should be replenished periodically. Our laundry staff recommends that seven to ten complete changes of clothes is sufficient for each resident. Gift items must be brought to the nurses' station for labeling. If you are considering lotions, perfumes, cosmetics, scissors, tools or any type of sharp object, please visit with staff about the resident's level of physical and cognitive function. Ensure they are capable of using the item and storing it securely. Aerosol cans are a safety concern so please choose an alternative. Medications, over-the-counter creams, drops, and ointments must also be cleared with nursing staff.

As a reminder, federal regulations prohibit the following: cloth mattresses, coffeemakers, portable heaters, curling irons, humidifiers, outlet adapters, extension cords, scented wax warmers, diffusers, scent plug ins, halogen and heat lamps, glue guns, foot stools, and throw rugs. Decorative lights cannot be hung in resident rooms. Cloth wall hangings must be fire treated and labeled (MSLCC will provide treatment product and labels upon request). Live Christmas trees and wreaths are not permitted. Artificial trees must meet all of the following criteria; 1) it is fire retardant treated and the lights are UL listed, 2) original packaging identifying retardant is in resident's room, 3) UL Listed tag is on the lights and stated on the box, and 4) tree and lights are plugged directly into an outlet. Fiber optic trees are acceptable; however, the base must be clear of cloth or paper and plugged directly into an outlet. Electrical Items must be UL Listed with tag and have either a polarized electrical plug (one side of plug-in is larger) or a threepronged plug. While all of these regulations may seem discouraging, you will agree that the safety and well-being of our residents needs to be our first priority.

Environmental Services Staff want to extend blessings to all in the coming Holiday Season with hopes of a measure of peace in the World, especially to all MSLCC residents, family, friends, vendors and staff.

Nutritional Services Department

We are happy to announce, due to the generosity of those who have donated to the MSLCC Foundation, several of our staff will be enrolled in the Association of Nutrition and Foodservice Professionals training program through the University of North Dakota.

Upon the successful completion of this training program, the staff will qualify to take the national certification exam to become Certified Dietary Managers. The employees selected have all been at MSLCC a number of years, and have advanced through many of the positions in the department. Those enrolled in the course are Julie Roth, 24 years; Sean Jacobson, 16 years; Bonnie Krushevsky, 14 years; Ashley Kintz, 10 years; and Loren Fuhrer, 10 years. Kay Wanner, RD, LRD, CDE, will be preceptoring the class. Sean Jacobson has been hired for our new mentor position. Along with his other duties he will be

available during the training phase for all new employees. He will be assessing their training process and ability to work independently along with fostering an environment that makes them comfortable coming to him with any concerns.

We have also received more direction from our regulatory agencies regarding food brought into the facility from a source not inspected by federal or state authorities. It is not the intention of the regulatory agencies, nor our intention, to prohibit family and friends from bringing food into the facility. Nor do we want to deny residents the enjoyment that comes with eating foods specially prepared for them by their loved ones. However, residents could be at risk if this outside food was not prepared, transported, or stored safely. Residents in nursing facilities typically have compromised immune systems due to age, illness, medications and/or medical treatments. Such individuals are more likely to become seriously ill from

contaminated food than the average healthy person. For these reasons we take food safety very seriously.

We encourage you to first let your dietitian know if there are certain foods your family member enjoys that are not on our menus. Perhaps we can provide it. If you do bring something in, we prefer it be a single serving and it be labelled and dated. You can leave it in the nourishment center refrigerator. Staff on the unit have specific instructions for safe reheating of food. We suggest the resident consume it within 24 hours. Dietary staff will discard it five days from the date on the container.

We would like to say thank you to our Foundation and the M-Club for donating money that will enable us to continue to provide fresh flowers on the dining room tables for the residents. We are so grateful we can continue the flowers; they enrich the residents dining experience and generate many positive comments.


