

MISSOURI SLOPE LUTHERAN CARE CENTER

SERVING FOR 50 YEARS

In the late 1950's a group of Lutheran pastors in Bismarck saw a need in our community for a new nursing home. After several years of meetings and planning, Missouri Slope Lutheran Home opened its doors in 1967. After several expansions and a name change, Missouri Slope Lutheran Care Center became the care center it is today, with 258 skilled nursing beds and 64 assisted living apartments. Through the years, we are together enriching life.

- **1965** Ground breaking for Missouri Slope Lutheran Home (MSLH)
- 1967 First resident admitted
- 1973 West Wing addition of 40 Beds
- 1980 East Addition of 100 beds and 13 apartments
- 1987 Missouri Slope Lutheran Home became Missouri Slope Lutheran Care Center
- 1988 Foundation Articles of Incorporation issued
- 1992 Ground breaking for Valley View Heights Independent Living Units
- 2003 Valley View Heights converted to and licensed as a 30 unit Assisted Living Facility
- 1997 New Chapel and expanded dining area
- 2008 Valley View Heights II opens adding an additional 34 Assisted Living Apartments
- 2017 Purchase Agreement signed for Good Shepherd North property for a second campus



MANY CHANGES IN FIFTY YEARS

CHALLENGES

The senior living scene has changed quite dramatically over the past 50 years. People's needs are as various as the number of options to meet them.

- 1) When MSLCC first opened in 1967, about one in ten residents used a wheelchair to get around. Today, about one in ten residents do not require a wheelchair.
- 2) Other equipment and devices that had not yet been conceived of at that time are now in use daily. These include mechanical lifts, oxygen concentrators and powered recliners, to name a few. These new and most helpful devices, however can also pose potential risks of injury when the space to accommodate them was not designed for them.
- 3) The level of care provided in the MSLCC skilled nursing home is much greater than ever before. The facility that brought this ministry through the first half-century will not be the one to get us through the next half-century.
- 4) In this industry, there is constant pressure to do more with less as nursing home regulations and reimbursement rates are constantly becoming more of a challenge. It is not possible to simply do things the way we always have.

Gratefully, the MSLCC board of directors, member churches, leadership team, residents, tenants, and staff have progressive, forward thinking hearts and minds. Our residents and their families continue to demand and deserve excellent services to meet their needs. Projections of the need for more nursing home beds, assisted living and independent living in the service area of MSLCC also drive this plan. MARKET ANALYSIS OF THE GREATER BISMARCK MANDAN AREA

completed by Health Planning & Management Resources, Inc. Loretto, Minnesota

In 2020, the unmet demand for nursing home beds is 144, subsidized assisted living is 51, subsidized memory care assisted living is 156, and independent housing with services is 33. In 2022, the unmet demand for nursing home beds increases to 273, subsidized assisted living is 39, subsidized memory care assisted living is 167, and independent housing with services is 68.

Remodeling the current campus is not possible without totally shutting down hundreds of nursing home beds at a time. This would be a disservice to the community.

Therefore, plans have been developed to pursue a second campus. This will alleviate pressure on current facilities so that it, too, can be rebuilt without affecting the supply of services in our community.

SOLUTIONS DEVELOPED

WITHIN A GREATER VISION

Building a new campus presents the opportunity to design for the future of senior living. The design team has kept the following elements in front of each and every decision: efficiency, quality, safety, and the resident/customer experience. Instead of bringing residents out to services, the design would become bringing the services to the residents. No more unnecessary steps/trips will be taken pushing wheelchairs around to large dining rooms on the perimeter of the campus. Facilities will be built vertically, shrinking the footprint and reducing the travel time. Call lights will be answered faster, employees will have nearby access to equipment, and all residents will enjoy private rooms.

Additional services to meet current and future demand include an advanced rehabilitation department with a warm water hydrotherapy pool. Care for more acute residents will be improved with piped in mechanical gasses and suctioning. Additional skilled memory care beds, subsidized assisted living, independent housing, adult day care, and several amenities such as a café/bistro and gathering spaces both inside and out will be built.

The workforce is what makes MSLCC great. The challenge in this day and age is to recruit and retain excellent team members. This plan will provide an onsite child day care center exclusively for our team members. This will not only help us recruit excellent employees, it also offers intergenerational programming that is shown to provide many benefits. Bringing the greatest generation together with the youngest generation on a daily basis improves employee morale and resident satisfaction plus builds character for the little ones.

The senior living industry has an incredible challenge to overcome with a large demographic of the U.S. population aging and starting to access senior living services. Developed in 2015, the MSLCC vision is to become a care center of learning and innovation.

MSLCC wants to take the same approach being used in teaching hospitals across the country and create a teaching nursing facility. The dream is to offer a place where the best and brightest come together each day to research, develop and implement ways to promote quality and safety in senior living. The goal is to partner with local educational institutions to bring the students of all ages and career paths onto the MSLCC campus where they can experience all that the senior living industry has to offer. Getting more people excited and aware of options in senior living will help solve workforce needs for MSLCC.



NAMING, MEMORIAL AND TRIBUTE GIFTS

Naming, memorial and tribute gift opportunities will available to individuals, families, businesses, and foundations contributing major gifts to the campaign. Recognition of all naming, memorial and tribute gifts will be tastefully presented at a visible location at the new North Campus facility.

The proposed campaign will be conducted through the MSLCC Foundation and will seek gifts from individuals, families, foundations and congregations. Gifts will be received in the form of cash, contributions from required minimum distributions from IRAs, as well as assets readily converted to cash.

Gifts may be committed over a three- to five-year pledge period and on a schedule chosen by the donor.



CONGREGATION GIFTS CAMPAIGN

Each MSLCC owner congregation will be asked to participate in this challenging campaign effort through a careful three-step process:

- **STEP 1** Receive a congregation council visit to learn the specifics of the campaign projects, timetable and activities.
- STEP 2 Select a member of the congregation to serve as the campaign leader and have that selected leader attend an orientation and training program conducted by MSLCC.
- STEP 3 Set a goal* for the congregation and then conduct a five-week campaign effort that offers every member family of the congregation an opportunity to participate through a contribution.

CONGREGATION GOALS

Each congregation will be asked to set a non-binding, three-year goal for their campaign effort. Recommended goal levels are proposed on the basis of the average weekly worship attendance of the congregations since most pastors and lay leaders consider that statistic to reflect the effective size of their congregation. The following are the proposed goal levels for congregations.

BASIC GOAL \$100 PER WORSHIPPER
ADVANCE GOAL \$200 PER WORSHIPPER
CHALLENGE GOAL \$300 PER WORSHIPPER

CHALLENGE GOAL \$500 FER WORSHIFFER

For example, a congregation with an average weekly worship attendance of 100 persons could select from among the following three-year goals:

BASIC GOAL \$10,000

ADVANCE GOAL \$20,000

CHALLENGE GOAL \$30,000


